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

You get shorter, cooler days with even colder nights, leaves start to fall, a crisp wind, and the annual Belvidere Prairie Riders Grass Drags & Swap Meet, presented by Hammertime Sports at the Boone County Fair Grounds in Belvidere. It's the biggest snowmobile show in Illinois, and this year they celebrated their 27th anniversary.

The always awesome snowmobile racing event got even bigger this year with the addition of Side X Side racing. This is a top-notch racing track with starting line Christmas tree lights and a state-of-the-art timing system. It's a 500-foot track with 1,100 feet of shut down. There was lots of racing again this year, with 44 snowmobile heat races and 19 Side X Side heat races. Plus, they have the famous and ever-so-fun to watch kids mini class races.

New or old, you can find any kind of snowmobile thing you need here, and all kinds of motorsports stuff. From dealers showing the latest and greatest stuff to swappers selling that special part you need for an older sled, there's a little bit of everything, including those old, hard-to-find missing pieces you're looking for. From roto tillers to lawn chairs, who knows what you'll need, or not need and get anyway! There are no reservations needed for swap or retail dealers and no size limits. You can pack up your stuff and head over first thing in the morning, set up shop, and see what you can sell. The Prairie Riders are also nice enough to let the snowmobile clubs that make up Region 5 set up a food tent. This food tent is the major fundraiser for the region. Members (volunteers) from all the clubs help shop, transport, set up, cook, work, clean up and put everything back in storage, which is a major undertaking. The morning started with Region 5 volunteers serving biscuits and gravy, doughnuts, coffee, and hot chocolate. The lunch menu consisted of hot dogs, chili dogs, hamburgers, cheeseburgers, brats, pulled pork sandwiches, chili, nachos, chips pop, water, and Monster Energy drinks. They had something for everyone, I'd hope.

The weather was perfect; mostly sunny, 70s with a slight wind. Lots of people (over 2,200 was the last number I heard) came out and had a great day at the show. 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
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


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2022 Harry Kroll & Mel Blaurock Memorial Award Winners

The Harry Kroll and Mel Blaurock Memorial Trophy is the oldest award presented by the Illinois Association of Snowmobile Clubs (IASC). It was initially named for the second president of the Northeastern Illinois Association of Snowmobiles Clubs (Region 1), Harry Kroll. Harry's two main pushes were to organize new clubs and to connect all the club trails into a network. He was a very dedicated snowmobiler who worked during the day and spent his evenings helping friends work on snowmobiles so he could have someone to ride with on the weekends.

Mel Blaurock was Harry's friend and served as his vice president. He continued to be involved in the sport in many levels after Harry passed away. Mel's name was added to the award after Mel passed away in 2020. Mel also believed in organizing snowmobile clubs and an organized snowmobile trail network. He also cared about protecting landowners. Mel worked with others to help the state of Illinois establish favorable snowmobile laws as well as a safety education program (SEP). Mel was a regular attendee at NIASC (Region 1), McHenry County Association (Region 2), and Illinois Association of Snowmobile Clubs (IASC) and always provided a wealth of information from the past. This award is given to a person or persons who is unbelievably dedicated to the sport and has done amazing and outstanding work to promote the sport of snowmobiling.

I feel honored and fortunate to have known Mel and enjoyed talking with him about the old days when you hit the trails with a pocket full of spark plugs hoping you had enough to get through the day. Before Mel's passing, I believe he was at every IASC meeting I ever attended. The 2022 winners of the Harry Kroll & Mel Blaurock Memorial Trophy were Wayne and Shirley Hinz. Unfortunately, it is with a very heavy heart that I must say both Wayne and Shirley passed away in 2022. Wayne on January 10th due to complications from Covid, and just recently Shirley on October 12th from heart failure. God asked Shirley to come join Wayne in his kingdom where they are reunited again, probably trail riding right now on perfectly groomed trails. I know they will be smiling down upon us this snowmobile season.

Wayne and Shirley were members of the Marengo SnoGoers and Huntley Penguins in Illinois, the Boulder Junction, Presque Isle Sno-Bunnies, and Lac Du Flambeau Northern Hornshoe Clubs in Wisconsin, and associate members of the Michigan Snowmobile and Off Vehicle Association (MISORVA). Wayne and Shirly had a true passion for snowmobiling, and it showed in every aspect of their lives. Over the years, Wayne and Shirly held multiple board positions with the Marengo SnoGoers Snowmobile Club, Region 5 of the IASC, and The Illinois Association of Snowmobile Clubs. Shirley was the IASC Secretary in 1990, 1994 and 1995 and Secretary of the SnoGoers for the last 10 years. The Hinz family were recipients of the "Snowmobile Family of the Year" at the 2016 IASC Convention and Wayne and Shirley were also past convention "King and Queen." Another fun fact about Wayne and Shirley is that as a couple, they had logged over 130,000 miles riding together. All those miles on the trails were in Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota, Colorado, Montana, Utah, as well as in Canada. If you think about it and do the math, that's over 3,000 miles a year for forty years; unbelievable! Wayne and Shirley also partook in the MS run from 1985 to 1990.

Wayne and Shirley enjoyed spending the winter months at their cabin in Boulder Junction. They were a genuine and kind couple that would open their doors to anybody at any anytime. Wayne and Shirley have been hosting the Region 5 ride out of their home in Boulder for the past 15+ years. Many Region 5 club members would get together for a few days and ride area trails and enjoy the trail rides that were usually guided by Wayne with Shirley right behind. At the end of the ride, on Saturday evening, everyone would gather at Wayne and Shirley's place to enjoy the annual "Chili Dump." It was a dinner with snacks and desserts where all would relax, overeat, indulge in some adult beverages, and always laugh at the days events and share snowmobile stories for hours on end.

Wayne and Shirley were true pioneers to the sport who constantly promoted clubs, trails, safety, and continually kept things going, even when times were tough. When you look at the list of people who have received this award over the years, it is truly the "who's who" of snowmobiling. Therefore, I thought it was wonderful to see them win this award. They are a couple I felt should be in this group of elite snowmobilers.

Wayne and Shirley's daughter, son in law, granddaughters, son, and daughter in law were able to attend the banquet and accept the award on Wayne and Shirley's behalf. It was very emotional for those who knew them and there were not many dry eyes in house that evening. Wayne and Shirley may be gone, but their snowmobiling legacy will live on forever through those who knew them.

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

Interesting Facts About Snowmobiling in Illinois

Governor Dan Walker proclaimed January 13, 1975 as "Think of Snow Day" for the state of Illinois due to the Segers Snow Seekers club.

The I&M canal was developed to connect the Great Lakes to the Mississippi River, and while instrumental in the settlement in Northern Illinois and was a major transportation corridor during the I800s, the purpose of the canal changed with the times. Recreation is now the main use and the IASC worked side by side with the Friends of the I&M for a national recognition with President Reagan signing a the Illinois and Michigan National Heritage Corridor Act in 1984. Because of the IASC, the I&M Canal has home to 61 miles of groomed trails throughout the years. Region 7 (located in the eastern half of north central Illinois) uses the I&M Canal as their major trail system. Running parallel to the Illinois River, its picturesque trail is a multi-use trail, as well. It also has bragging rights to be the first region to use the STEF grant to purchase a groomer in 1984.

In Region 6, 12.85 miles of trails between Freeport, IL and the Wisconsin state line is due to the Galena & Chicago Union Railroad having a line routed through Freeport, thanks in part to John Addams. This branch of trail is the Jane Addams Trail. It is part of the Grand Illinois Trail system. In 2013, the Jane Addams Trail was awarded the Coalition of Recreational Trails Award for construction and design. Former Trail Advisor, Greg Hodges, accepted the award in Washington DC.

In Region 4, the Hennepin Canal (constructed between 1871 – 1892 with first boat going through in 1907) was to reduce the distance from Chicago to Rock Island by 419 miles. The problem was the locks on both the Mississippi and Illinois Rivers were widened and the canal became obsolete before its opening. By the 1930s, it was used primarily for recreational traffic. It is a 104.5 mile linear park which spans 5 counties. The entire canal is listed on the National Register of Historic

Places. The Hennepin boasts the 91 miles on the tow path as the longest snowmobile trail in the state.

In 1975, the IASC introduced a bill that would establish a Safety Education Program in Illinois that would be managed by the Illinois Department of Conservation (now called the IDNR), but that bill failed. But an almost identical bill introduced by the IDOC passed paving the way for our current program. We have continued to have a working relationship with the IDNR for our grant programs and safety programs throughout the state. Our safety program is made up of volunteer instructors that take the IDNR Safety Program and tests. Once passed, the instructors can schedule classes to give the rider that best education of the rules of snowmobiling to ensure the best and safest ride possible. Our program is open to anyone 12 years and older interested in taking the 8 hour class to receive the safety certificate card needed to drive a sled on the public trails if there is a responsible adult over the age of 18 riding along with them. This card has reciprocity to the other snow states and needed in many, up to the age of 26, to be able to ride their trails.

The Illinois Snowmobiler Magazine has had changes throughout the years. It was originally published through the summer of 1997 and edited by Earl and Nayola Nielson. It was then published and edited by Paul Hertzberg from September1997 – Spring of 1982. Leisure Features Publications published the magazine from September of 1982 – March of 1984 with Tom Anderson was the editor. Waupaca Publishing Co. from September 1984 – March of 1998, PrintComm to over from September 1998 – March of 2009. Cathy Hanson was the editor. MSPN from Sept. 2009 – 2011 and Cathy Hanson was also the editor. From September of 2011 through today, the Illinois Snowmobiler Magazine has been published by KDR Publications with managing editor is Danielle Christoffel. The magazine will be online going and after this season. It will no longer be a printed copy.

Looking Back on 50 Years of the IASC

With this being our 50th anniversary of organized snowmobiling in Illinois, I thought I would bring you some information about how it all got started.

In the winter of 1971/1972, there were approximately 1 ½ miles of snowmobile trails that were shared by 9 Illinois clubs. These clubs included: Polar Pairs, Harmony, Top-o-State, Wauconda, Oak Park, Hotel Snow Bugs, Chicagoland Snowmobile Association, Woodstock and Evergreen Park. Membership at one time reached as high as 102 clubs, 3,200 family members, 58 associate members and 54 business members. Illinois was considered the 3rd largest snowmobile state association with 63,000 sleds registered in the state. Today, the total number of clubs has combined or cease to exist, bringing totals to 50 clubs, 1,600 members, 51 business associates and 17 individual members. The registration of sled has also dwindled and of the original nine clubs, there is only one remaining charter member, Woodstock Snowmobile Club.

The original snowmobile association in 1972 was the Chicagoland Snowmobile Association. Their efforts provided the first snowmobile law in Illinois. The cost of passing the law was over \$10,000 and forced the association to go bankrupt. The IASC was formed to take over where the CSA left off and gave us what we have today. Today, there are approximately 2,500 miles of trails maintained by the IASC clubs and members, all volunteered and organized.

The state was divided into 9 regions around 1974. The regions were developed by dividing the state up according to the number of registered sleds, so each regions has an equal number of snowmobilers. By doing this, it made communication between snowmobile clubs easier and more available throughout the state. It also helped to share the workload of the association. The boundaries have changed several times to make it easier for clubs to attend meetings.

There have been presidents in the IASC. The first president for Earl Nelson in 1972. He was involved with getting the IASC up and running along with Ron Hambly, Mel Blaurock, Roy Redman and Red Seger The list of IASC Presidents is as follows: Roy Redman(1973), Red Seger (1974), Jim Sleep (1975-76), Ron Hambly (1977-78), Tom Gardner (1979-80), Chuck Ronchetti (1981), Elwin (Tiny) Sanders (19982-83), George Gore (1984-85), Eric Menssen (1986-87), James (7) Bond (1988-89), Marv Taylor (1990-91), Bill Schumann (1992-97) John Lyon (1998-2000), Mark Hazzard (2001-003), Steve Heffel (2004 – 06) Dan Long (2007-09), Sue Giese (2010 -12), Kirk Polhill (2013-

15), Brian Fradkin (2016–17), Mason Long (2018-2020), and George Thompson (2021 – current).

The first four to six IASC meeting were held in Spring Grove at the Polar Pairs Clubhouse at the Rudolph Breezy Lawn Farm. After that, each month was a traveling meeting to different parts of the state. Most of the meetings during that time were held at the Golden Steer Restaurant in Aurora. Meetings are currently held in Rochelle. This location was determined to be centrally located in the state according to the membership

The first convention was held January 26, 27, and 28 in 1973 at Hunters Country Club in Richmond, IL. Members from thirteen clubs were in attendance. The convention consisted of an annual meeting, election of officers, seminars, meals, a dance, a shopping tour for the ladies and a trail ride. The format has been nearly the same, except for the trail ride which is next to impossible in November. It has been the tradition of late that each of the regions take turns in hosting the convention. The convention also stretched into Friday night meet and greet and games. Saturday the seminars were held in the morning, lunch had a guest speaker at times. The annual meeting is held in the afternoon and then dinner had a guest speaker and the awards for various subjects, including Dealer of the Year, Snowmobile Family of the Year, Snowmobiler of the Year, Harry Kroll Award, Charles Metcalf Award, Sam Mandonia Award. The last couple years, an award has been presented to someone who has been instrumental of making sure things don't fall through the cracks and kept the IASC together. This award is called the Glue Award. The past also held a brunch on Sunday morning dedicated to the youth of the sport. Winners of the Yamaha Challenge were recognized as well as the winners of the scholarship essay contest.

This year, things are different. The IASC is now trying a pilot program of hosting the event in one day. Trying to keep the costs down and trying to meet the needs and requests of the membership as much as possible. Each region was assigned a particular part of the convention so that no one region beared the burden of the work that it requires to host the convention and to help collect the funds necessary to pay the entertainment and other costs incurred.

While the jury is still out on the new workings, I will say that all clubs stepped up and made the convention informative, social and fun.

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

Ken's Tales From the Earlier Years

TALES FROM THE EARLIER DAYS

So many things were going on in the eighties that it was a challenge keeping up with everything. Many of happenings were for the good but some were not. One such story has to do with the John Deere line of snowmobiles. From the year 1971 up to 1982 John Deere snowmobiles were manufactured in Horicon, Wisconsin, a short distance from Madison.

They became very popular and an instant hit in the Midwest. Just about every farmer I knew had a sled sitting in their shed. I believe a lot of deals were made when they were out buying tractors, combines and other farm related machinery. It seems more often than not a new John Deere snowmobile was



included in the deal. Mind you now, these weren't cheaply built sleds and the support and service end was the best in the industry, bar none. They had a lot of notable features especially models like the trail fire and liquefier in which the engines were mounted with a low center of gravity making them very good handling along with being extremely durable. In fact they were so good that by 1974 almost 50% of the 377 sleds entered in the Winnipeg to St. Paul 500, the biggest cross country race of its day, were John Deere's. The word spread "get the green" if you want to run with the leaders and sure enough Brian Nelson took 1st place by winning the race in 1976. The company also went on to become the official supplier of snowmobiles for the 1980 winter Olympics in Placid, New York. So what in the world happened to such a great company and its sleds that they are no longer around today? While it just so happens that around 1982 the John Deere management and directors made a crucial decision to put more resources into the ever expanding lawn and landscaping industry. Already a supplier of mowers with their 1st rider the 110 tractor introduced in 1963 they decided to expand the fleet with models that would compete with the cub cadets and other big suppliers of the time. So it was that in 1982 John Deere sold its snowmobile business to Polaris with an agreement for Polaris to supply parts and service support to all the dealers' network and with the rights to continue the manufacturing of the snowmobiles. The last models manufactured by John Deere were the Sprintfire and the Snowfire and were sold in 1983. The intent by Polaris to continue building new models was contingent on sufficient dealer demand. Unfortunately the following year the dealer demand was not strong enough to justify production

and so they announced that manufacturing would come to an end. Under the terms of the sale John Deere was to continue supplying clothing and accessories to the dealers' network through 1984-1985 at which time it would become Polaris's responsibility. With the sleds no longer to be made so it was decided the same with the clothing. The last two models made went out with some notoriety. They both finished high in the economy runs conducted in 1984. Based on four runs totaling 100 miles the Sprintfire finished 3rd with an average mileage of 26.05 and the Snowfire averaged 23.63. The winner was a Polaris star with an average of 29.28, and a Yamaha bravo was second with an average of 27.82. However, both of those sleds were single cylinders of 224 & 246 cc's whereas the John Deere's were 339 cc twin cylinders, so they were still named tops in their class. So, with such a fabulous history where does that leave us now. As you might expect the John Deere snowmobiles are among the favorites by vintage sled collectors and you're sure to come across them at most, if not all vintage events and shows. The clothing is also sought out by collectors as the colorful bibs and jackets make a great match with sleds. I'm hoping there's snow outside by the time you read this.





I became involved with snowmobiling way back in the early 70's when it was still in its infancy and rapidly growing. Having joined a club my very first year brought with it all the organizational activities taking place in Illinois as well as the entire Midwest. Various papers and publications about snowmobiling were starting up all over and, partly because of my hoarding ways and later by purpose, I have virtually compiled a documented history of snowmobiling from its earliest years to the

present. It's easy to spend hours reading about these past days and how snowmobiling evolved to the sport we enjoy today. I hope you will enjoy my tales of earlier days as much as I do.



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
