





The Hampshire White Riders food tent served up loaded baked potatoes with butter, sour cream, chill, cheese, salt and pepper, nachos with cheese and jalapeno peppers on the side, sweet corn dipped (soaked) in butter, pop and water. We also had a table set up next to the beer stand where we sold our club fundraiser tickets. This worked out very well as it seems the beer stand is visited by about everyone at the show. The south entrance gate was also manned by Hampshire White Riders club members.

It drizzled for about an hour after lunch, but not too many people left. Awards were given out around 2:30 for the different classes of cars, a 50/50 raffle was held along with an auction of a couple of unique car items with all the proceeds going to local and national nonprofit organizations, such as the Hampshire/Burlington Food Pantry, Burlington Fire Department, VFW, Lions Club, American Cancer Society, and Lurie Children's Hospital. Once that was all over with, people slowly started leaving and the Hampshire White Riders took down all the fencing and loaded it on to a trailer for the car club and packed up our tent putting everything back in the storage unit for next year. Club renewals, you should have received your club renewal in early November. These are due in the IASC office December 31st.

Shirley R. Hinz, 79, of Marengo, IL, passed away on October 12, 2022. Shirley was born on August 3, 1943, in Lincoln, Nebraska to Hubert and Alma Schultz. At a young age, Shirley and her family moved to Illinois. She grew up on a farm in Woodstock and loved to show her animals, competing at local fairs in the area. In 1962, Shirley graduated from Woodstock High School. On January 23, 1965, Shirley married Wayne Hinz. Shirley and Wayne were high school sweethearts after meeting at the 4H Busy Beavers Club in Cary, IL. Shirley worked as a bookkeeper for Floor to Ceiling Store for over 20 years.

Shirley and her husband Wayne loved to spend their winters snowmobiling up north at their cabin. They were very active in the IASC, the Region 5 snowmobile clubs, and the local Marengo Snow Goers Club. Shirley was the SnowGoers treasure the last ten years. Shirley held the treasure and secretary board positions for Region 5 several times between 1989 and 2000. Shirley was the Illinois Association of Snowmobile club's secretary for three seasons: 1990, 1994, and 1995.

Together, Shirly and Wayne belong to five snowmobile clubs; the Marengo Snowgoers, and the Huntley Penguins clubs in Illinois, and the Boulder Junction, Presque Isle Sno-Bunnies, and the Lac Du Flambeau Northern Hornshoe clubs in Wisconsin. Additionally, this makes them members of the Illinois and Wisconsin Snowmobile Associations. Not to be forgotten, they're even associate members of the Michigan Snowmobile Association. Shirly and Wayne have ridden in the states of Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota, Colorado, Montana, and Utah, and also in Canada. Together, they have put in over 130,000 miles. That's an average of over 3,000 miles a year, every year, for over forty years!

They rode in The MS500 run for five years from 1985 to 1990. They put in many hours setting up and operating the Region 5 radar run from 1988 to 1996. They were the IASC King and Queen, the IASC Family of the Tear, and attended the International Snowmobile Congress. They have been majorly involved in the SnowGoers Snowmobile Club Brat Fry and main fundraiser from 1980 to present. Every Region 5 hosted



IASC conventions since 1989 has been made possible by Shirly negotiating the hotel accommodations and putting in countless hours before, during, and after working. If that wasn't enough, they've helped set up and worked the Region 5 food tent, the region's major fundraiser at the Belvidere Grass Drags and Swap Meet from 1989 to present. Lastly, they have also hosted the Region 5 Unity Snowmobile Ride in Boulder Junction, Wisconsin for the past fifteen years. They met and

made many close and special friends over the years attending these club activities.

Shirley was a faithful and devoted member of Zion Lutheran Church of Marengo. Shirley was a faithful and devoted wife to Wayne for 57 years and a wonderful mother, mother-in-law, and grandma. Shirley lived to serve, above all else, God and her family. There was nothing she loved more than spending time with her children, grandchildren, and friends.

Shirley was preceded in death by her husband Wayne Hinz. A Visitation was held on Thursday, October 20, 2022, from 4pm to 8pm at Zion Lutheran Church and burial on Friday, October 21, at Windridge Memorial Park in Cary, IL. In lieu of flowers memorials can be made in Shirley's name to Zion Lutheran Church in Marengo, IL.

She was a pleasure to be around and though we will miss her, her impact on the snowmobile community and beyond will never be forgotten If you're reading this, consider doing a little something extra for your local club or taking a little bit more time to enjoy the trails this year in Shirley's memory. She is now reunited with Wayne in Heaven. RIP, I miss you both.

Planning a Congress: Part 2

I left off last time by telling you how we came to be chosen as the Hosts for the International Snowmobile Congress (ISC) and the steps we took to pick a venue, put together a team of volunteers and started working on putting the event together.

The Steering Committee for the IASC ISC 2023 has been busy from the start. Jane Austin and Sue Giese are the co-chairs for the event. Don Schaefer is Secretary and Carol Bly-Julian is Treasurer, George and Joanne Thompson, Dan and Cathy Damptz, Mike and Barb Dicker, Mark and Ellen Hazzard all round out the Committee. Each one has volunteered to help put the work in needed to host this event. They have already made commitments to attend a meeting once a month as well as handle other things.

Now that the facility for the event has been chosen and contracted, the hotel has been secured and the overflow hotel secured, we can give you some more specific information. The entire event will be held in Moline, IL. at the TaxSlayer Arena. This is an enclosed facility that houses semi pro hockey, concerts, etc. We are very excited about the space. It will allow us to not only have plenty of room for meals, but the participants will be able to view the Groomers and talk to the sales representatives whenever they want and not have to worry about the weather. The Silent Auction that is held will also be available to be viewed whenever someone is in the arena. There is a Jumbo Video Wall that will allow everyone to see the speakers on stage. There is also a Video Ribbon, that runs all around the area and anyone who sponsors our event will have their ad posted and viewed all day long on the ribbon.

Moline is very excited about us coming in June 2023 and has done many things that have helped us. The Visit Quad Cities Chamber of Commerce has secured a monetary grant to be given after the event is held. The Restaurants and Hotels has also offered us a monetary gift. The Host Hotel, now called the Wyndham on John Deere Commons, has offered special room rate and will be giving us a reimbursement for each room, reserved per day, back to the IASC ISC. The offsite excursion is a cruise on the Mississippi River for a dinner and entertainment cruise. We were able to secure a sponsor to pay for the cruise. Along with the donation of \$30,000 that the four Manufacturers donate for help with the meals allows us to have a great head start on making the event a reality.

Now we that we have the place, hotels, offsite and plans set it was time to get the approval of the ISC Planning Committee's approval of the event. The ISC Planning Committee comprises of a representative of each group that meets during the Congress as well as the hosts of the past ISC and next ISC. Andrea Willey represented Iowa, Manufacturers had Ed Klem represent, Administrators had Yvonne Rideout from Canada, Iron Dogs had Christine Jourdain. Bob King and Judy King represented Media and Tourism, Dan Long, ACSA president, Joe Thievin, from Canada, represented CCSO and Christine Jourdain, executive director for ACSA. The IASC reps were George Thompson, president, Jane



Austin, Sue Giese, Don Schafer and Carol Bly-Jillian.

The meeting was held in Moline, so the ISC Planning Committee could tour all the facilities and check out the area establishments. We took them out to one of the Pizza places just a short walk from the hotel. It was a very nice gathering, and we enjoyed the social evening. The next day was a tour of the TaxSlayer, both Hotels, and a Planning Committee meeting. Andrea Willey, chair of the Iowa ISC 2022 gave her final report and all the books on ISC 2022 were closed. It was time to start approving our plans for ISC. The biggest change, that has many concerned, is that we are not going to be having the general meetings during a 7 am Breakfast. The hotels charge you for the breakfast whether you use it or not. Lots of people don't even come until the guest speakers are going to start. We are going to have the general meetings and speakers during a lunch. No more the same choices for 3 days. Lunch allows us to have a variety of choices for meals. Seminars can start at 8:30, break for Lunch and Speakers around noon and then more meetings/seminars.We got the approval to try it as a pilot program and we are very excited to show that there are options out there and that as one of the members of the of the Planning Committee stated, "Change is good".

After a day of walking and meeting, Dan and Barb Long very graciously hosted a wonderful dinner at their place. Everyone, again, had a chance to relax and get to know each other on a more personal level. The weather was gorgeous, the food delicious and company was very enjoyable.

The following morning everyone headed out to the next stop on their agendas. We all got the feeling that things went well and on the right path for ISC 2023.

Our meetings for the IASC ISC Steering Committee is now in the process of buckling down and working on getting Sponsors for one of many opportunities. Even a Coffee Break or Afternoon Break, Welcome to IASC ISC 2023 Hospitality. If you're out there trail marking or brushing trails, make sure you are not doing that alone. An accident can happen there just as it can on a snowmobile trail. So after you get your permissions from landowners, the crops are out and it isn't too wet out, get out there with some members to get trails marked. I bet even a non-member would go just to see what all is involved when brushing trails and setting trail markers. They may find they actually have some fun while doing this kind of work. We need to show this younger crowd the benefits of joining a club. Plus, we need their strong, healthy backs!

Club meetings are in full swing, Convention is happening in November, work days are being scheduled, so please make plans to get involved at least at the club level this year. Clubs can always use someone with a new perspective on things. Those of us who have been club members for 40+ years sometimes don't always have the freshest outlook on things and how they are done. I'll probably have to put a more safetyoriented article out in the near future, but I hope this gets folks thinking about all things snowmobile-related. That, along with safety, of course. Ken's Tales From the Earlier Years

Imagine being in your 20's or 30's with the resources to buy a thunder "JET". Perhaps I should clarify that as a state of the art 1974 SST Free Air Sno-Jet snowmobile. Mind you, this was not just another O hum recreational trail sled, but a fully engineered sled that featured the speed, stability and handling that was among the best in the marketplace. The sled featured

A tapered tunnel, new clutch, SDI ignition, slide valve carbs and a front mounted engine with a low center of gravity, 30" skis w/ carbides and a special light weight high performance track. In addition it had many more convenience and safety features too numerous to mention



here. In fact this sled was so outstanding in the F/A class that they dominated all over Canada, Michigan, the ASA and the SWSRA races in Wisconsin. Hall of fame driver, Jim Adema, took this sled to two consecutive Kawasaki cup wins and lan Corbett won a world cup.

In Peterborough, Ontario. These were considered to be the oldest and most prestigious race events of that era. So with all the history of Ski-doo and Polaris how did a company like Sno-Jet become so prominent at the time. The company started out of Canada and built 25 units its first year in 1965. The company grew so fast that it had sold over 25,000 sleds by the 68-69 season. Even so the original owners decided they wanted to get out of the market and before the end of 1968 ownership was transfer to Conroy Inc, a company that built and owned the Glastron Boat Company. Under their leadership the sales continued to soar reaching 31,181 units in 1970. But things started to turn and by 1974 the oil embargo caused our economy to collapse as the country experience the highest gas prices ever up to that time. Boy does that sound familiar in 2022? The turn in the economy caused many small companies to collapse but in the 1975 sales brochure Keith Orme, president and CEO of Conroy was so committed to the future of snowmobiling that the brochure announced the completion of a 3.5 million dollar plant expansion to meet the future demand and openly invited snowmobilers to compare the '75 Sno-jet machine with any other machine in the market. At the same time the company ran into problems on the race circuit. The USSA decided to start a new professional racing circuit but to qualify sleds had to have some kind of production limit and the thunder jet was not able to meet the requirements. As a result, the Sno-jet was only able to race in other associations where it was qualified.

With the continued downturn in the economy and despite their early successes they too decided to get out of the snowmobile market. Hello Kawasaki! It just so happened that Kawasaki was looking for a way to get into the market the same time Conroy was thinking of getting out and so a deal was made and ownership was transferred to Kawasaki USA. Kawasaki USA had a contract with Japan's Kawasaki heavy Industries division in 1973 to build and provide them with a snowmobile no later than 1977 or else loose the contract but it had become apparent that Japan's heavy Industries division would not be able to have a sled ready before 1978 so this seemed to be a perfect solution. They continued to have Sno-Jet build the machines and send them directly to the Kawasaki dealers and then passed on all the bills to Japan to be paid. From 1977 to 1980 only the invaders and intruders were built with all other waste forwarded to Japan for payment, what a sweet deal. This was not to last, in 1983 just three weeks before all the dealers meetings the board of directors in Japan took a hard look at the track record and the huge debt that Kawasaki USA stuck them with they voted to shut down and close the USA division. The last year of production was 1976 which an estimated 4,000 to 5,000 machines were built. Some of the innovations they invented are still present in our modern machines. The next time you go to a vintage show or museum be sure to look for one.





I became involved with snowmobiling way back in the early 70's when it was still in its infancy and rapidly growing. Having joined a club my very first year brought with it all the organizational activities taking place in Illinois as well as the entire Midwest. Various papers and publications about snowmobiling were starting up all over and, partly because of my hoarding ways and later by purpose, I have virtually compiled a documented history of snowmobiling from its earliest years to the
