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

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A NOTE FROM THE TREASURER

This month I want to take a moment to talk about your club and region reporting responsibilities.

As a not-for-profit organization, you have specific tax reporting responsibilities. It is crucial that you adhere to these obligations to maintain your tax-exempt status. Many of you may operate using a fiscal year meaning the beginning and end of your accounting period is not January 1st to December 31st. The deadline for filing your federal 990 form is the 15th day of the 5th month after the end of your organization's accounting period. For example, if your fiscal year ends in April your deadline is September 15th. The type of 990 form you file depends on your annual income.

You also have a responsibility to stay up to date with the Illinois Secretary of State's annual report filing. The due date for that report will vary. The annual report is mailed to the address your organization has on file with the Secretary of State's office and can be changed as needed. If you have any questions regarding the status of your organization, you can search the Illinois Secretary of State's website business services section at https://www. ilsos.gov for the details.

There are many reasons for staying up to date with these filings. The one that I want to make you aware of is grant reimbursement. If you are not current with your filings, you are not able to receive grant funds. At this point you should have submitted your insurance premium payment. The reimbursement for those premiums is through grant funding. Insurance is one of the largest expenses for most clubs, making loss of reimbursement important to financial success for your organization.

Although keeping your paperwork in order seems like a lot of work, once you have everything on track it does not take that much to keep it going. So, take the time to check the status of your organization's filings.

I have said it before, but it bears repeating, your work is the reason we have snowmobile trails available in Illinois! Thank you!



Sunday October 1st, sunny clear sky and temps in the upper 80's. You may not think this was snowmobile weather or a snowmobile kind of day but it most certainly was. The official start of snowmobile season has arrived in Illinois. Today is the 28th Annual Belvidere Prairie Riders Grass Drags and Power Sports Swap Meet at the Boone County Fair Grounds in Belvidere, Illinois, sponsored by Hammertime Sports of Belvidere, IL and Loves Park Motorsports in Loves Park, IL.

This is an awesome event. The biggest swap meet around here next to Haydays. About 2000 people attended the event to see over 220 swappers and vendors. Plus, great racing right in your backyard, not a couple hundred miles away. You also can't get much more affordable, it's only five bucks to get in, twenty-dollar race fee, fifty-dollars for vendors and twenty-five for a swap space. That's a nice deal.

Like most swap meets there are several dealers on site with both new and used snowmobiles, ATVS and UTVs, clothing, helmets, and accessories. There are also swappers with every hard to locate item for your older sleds. The event is a motorsports swap meet so you'll find every kind of gadget with a motor on it and possibly a bird house or lawn mower too. All the things you need and shouldn't be without.

I have never grass drag raced but I'm told by some of the best grass drag racers in the Midwest that this is a super track. One that they look forward to coming to every year. Four lanes, 500 feet long with 1100 feet for shut down and state of the art timing system. 103 snowmobiles and 15 SXS's registered for racing today. That resulted in 55 heats of snowmobiles and 14 heats of SxS racing. The top speed of the day was just over 115mph in 500 feet, WOW! The famous kid's mini sled race is always a big draw for the future generation. That's a great day of racing to see.

The Belvidere Prairie Riders Snowmobile Club is part of Region 5 of The Illinois Association of Snowmobile Clubs and is kind enough to let the other clubs in Region 5 (Marengo SnowGoers, Huntley Penguins, Hampshire White Riders, De-Kane Snow Trackers, and the G.K. Trail Blazers) have a food tent at the event. This food tent is the major fund raiser for Region 5 every year. The day starts with biscuits and gravy, donuts, coffee, and hot chocolate, the breakfast of champions. Followed up by brats, hot dogs, chili dogs, burgers, cheeseburgers, pulled pork, nachos with cheese, chips, candy, pop, bottled water, and Monster energy drinks. A great lunch menu for sure.

A lot of time and planning goes into an event like this for both the Prairie Riders and Region 5. The volunteers from both organizations deserve a big round of applause, Thank You soooo much for all the people who make this event possible. Countless hours go in to putting on a show of this magnitude and your efforts are greatly appreciated. I'd love to list every volunteer here who helped but I don't know all the names and I'd hate to forget someone but Thank You to everybody.

The International Snowmobile

A group of IASC members were sitting at a table in Omaha, Nebraska at the 2021 International Snowmobile Congress (ISC) when they were approached by members of the ISC Planning Committee and asked if Illinois was interested in hosting the ISC in 2023.Yes, 2 years away and remember, the COVID restrictions were just being lifted. The last time the IASC hosted the ISC was in 2001, and it was a successful event that was held in Itasca, IL. Two ladies, Jane Austin and Sue Giese, took the thought to heart and started the process. Having only 2 months to research locations and venues, the ladies prepared a proposal for IASC members to review. After much discussion, the members voted to submit the proposal and the ISC planning committee agreed to have the IASC as the host association for the 55th Annual ISC in June of 2023. The work started and after 2 years, the 55th Annual ISC held at the Vibrant Arena at the Mark on June 6-10, 2023, in Moline, II is now history.



The ISC is an annual meeting of representatives from organizations that form the International Snowmobile Council. The ISC provides a communication forum and a means of addressing issues that are common from an international perspective. For the past 55 years, snowmobile enthusiasts, manufactures, suppliers and representatives from state, provincial and national snowmobile organizations from around the world have met to celebrate the sport and to do business of snowmobiling. There are many organization meetings along with the annual meeting of the council. There is a vendor trade show highlighting their newest products to improve snowmobiling. The groomer exhibit allows companies to display their equipment. General sessions are held to allow attendees to hear speakers and, of course, many social events to meet new friends and to catch up with old friends. Individual participants include representatives from snowmobile and groomer manufacturers; state and federal administration; national, regional, and state snowmobile associations; state snowmobile clubs: recreational motorized enforcement agencies; tourism and media. Leaders meet at this conference for education, collaboration, networking, and fun!

On Tuesday, June 6, the first event of the 55th annual ISC was a motorcycle /car ride from Moline, IL to Hopedale, IL to have lunch and visit the Willis Snowmobile Museum. The weather was great for a ride on the backroads of Illinois through some of the rural towns of Illinois. The event was well attended with about 40 participants and a variety of vehicles. The participants were greeted at the

museum by the family of Russell "Huck" Willis who started the museum as a hobby, but the collection grew to over 160 models and other related snowmobile memorabilia. Sadly, Huck passed away in May of 2023 and was unable to greet the attendees. We thank the Willis family for opening the museum to allow people from the conference to visit.



Wednesday, June 7, started out by working to set up the venue and registration booth. Vendors and groomer companies were setting up their displays. Activity was very busy at the Vibrant Arena as you had the trade show area in the foyer with over 19 displays/booths and the groomer exhibitors on the main floor with 11 displays. In the afternoon, FOSPAC (Friends of Snowmobilers Political Action Committee) held a fundraising event at the Pour Brothers Craft Taproom. The attendees were treated to an afternoon of many different games and a variety of food options. This was a great way to get involved with the political process as FOSPAC helps by donating to Federal candidates/congress/senators that show support for snowmobilers. After the FOSPAC, the 55th Annual ISC unofficially started with a welcome reception hosted by the Illinois Association of Snowmobile Clubs Wednesday night. This was held at one of the Vibrant Arena's reception areas with outside seating. It was well attended and a beautiful night outside. The band, Radio Flyer Pilots, which included a member from the Corn Belt Drift Busters, Craig Shehorn, entertained the attendees. Attendees played games as they met up with old friends and talked about the past snowmobile season as well as meeting a few new people.

Thursday started off with meetings of the many organizations that are members of the International Snowmobile Council that will continue throughout the ISC. These groups include the ACSA (American Council of Snowmobile Associations), CCSO (Canada Council of Snowmobile Organizations), ISMA (International Snowmobile Manufacture Association), IASA (International Association of Snowmobile Administrators), ISMC (International Snowmobile Media Council), ISTC (International Snowmobile Tourism Council), Iron Dog Brigade, ISC Northeast Chapter as well as the ACSA Trail and Mountain Groups. The main purpose of the ISC is to discuss the pressing issues facing snowmobilers at the

many different levels/groups that interact with snowmobilers. At lunch on Thursday was the opening ceremony and the 1st general session. The master of ceremony was our very own, George Thompson, President of the IASC, who did a great job! After the presentations of the flags that included a local unit of the US Army, George treated the attendees with an a-cappella presentation of the US National Anthem as well as the Canadian National Anthem. Next, there was a speaker from the All-American Heroes Foundation letting the attendees know about their mission to provide education for veterans and first responders through outdoor recreational therapy via safety and awareness. The main speaker on Thursday was Sean Considine, an 8-year NFL veteran and Super Bowl 47 Champion with the Baltimore Ravens. Sean discussed the importance of teamwork, respect and involving families and young adults to help grow your organizations. Sean along with his wife and 5 children live in Byron, IL. He is a member of the Byron Sno-Blasters, as well as a landowner that allow snowmobile trails on their property.

The big social event of the ISC is the off-site dinner that is held on Thursday night. This year, the attendees were treated to a river boat dinner cruise on the Mississippi River aboard the Celebration Belle. Again, the weather was great and there was a beautiful sunset that was a joy to see!

On Friday, the ISC goal of providing education is met as the day is made up of many education seminars and breakout sessions. This year, there were 8 different seminars that were available as follows: Volunteer Recruitment, Development and Retention by Yvonne Rideout, President of ISAS and Executive Director of SnoMan; Avalanche Awareness Round Table that included Jeff Hambelton of AIARE and Northwest Avalanche Center, Mark Staples of Utah Avalanche Center, Brent Strand of Avalanche Canada and Frank Carus of Teton Avalanche Center; Snowmobile Traction Safety by Snow Studs team members; Publishing Communication Open Forum by Midwest Sports Publishing Network team, Karen Middendrop of MISORVA and Christine Jourdain, ACSA EX Dir; Snowmobile Backpacking 101 by Hank Armbrecht; Economic Impact Studies Panel by Ed Klim, president ISMA and Robin Hanna, Project Mgr., Illinois Institute of Rural Affairs; Groomer Round Table by groomer exhibitors; SAE Snowmobile Challenge Team Presentation by the members of the University of Wisconsin-Platteville team; Trespassing Round Table by ACSA Trespassing Committee and Grant Application Process, by Steve Cowing of BRP and Christine Jourdain, ACSA Ex. Dir. The seminars were well attended the attendees learned a lot. Members of the IASC delegation attended these seminars and hopefully it will help them as they lead the IASC and help with the many issues that confront the IASC.

During the Friday General Session, Ed Klim, President of ISMA was the speaker and presented his annual state of snowmobile address. Although sales were down due to the embargo of sales to Russia, the snowmobile industry is staying afloat. Please note that the announcement of Yamaha leaving the snowmobile industry was announced after the ISC. Also, throughout the day, there was a "photo" scavenger Hunt that utilized the Channel Cat water taxi service on the Mississippi River. Friday night ended with the groomer reception in the exhibitor area. This allowed the attendees to mingle with representatives of the groomer and drag companies.

Saturday is the wrap up day and cleanup day of the ISC. Saturday morning all the organizations meet to wrap up their business. Then in the afternoon, the annual meeting of the International Snowmobile Council Meets and hears the reports from all the organizations and officers. A big theme of this year's ISC was the importance of including young adults with your organization to allow them to actively participate and be part of the process. All we need to think about is the average age of today's snowmobile club member to realize how true this is. The general session on Saturday included Mike Caplan as the speaker. Mike, who is an Emmy awardwinning meteorologist for Fox Chicago, provided a scientific and humorous presentation about predicting weather and the fact that we may or may not have a snowy winter.



Saturday night is the annual ISC banquet and awards presentation followed by the annual Thirsty Dog Gathering. It was a night of awards presented by ACSA, CCSO, and the Iron Dogs recognizing the people that go above and beyond for the sport as leaders, workers, groomer operators and businesses. It was a great privilege and honor to be at the dinner to see Mark Hazzard of the IASC be awarded the ACSA snowmobiler of the year. Congratulations, Mark. Between Dan Long, now past president of the ACSA, Mark Hazzard, ACSA Trails Group Facilitator and Dan Damptz, Trespass Committee member, the IASC is well represented with the ACSA. The night ended as we cleaned up the venue and participated in the Thirsty Dog Gathering that was held at the Pour Brothers Craft Taproom.

As you just read, the ISC is a major undertaking and involves a lot of planning. Attending the ISC opens up your eyes to the stuff that goes on behind the scenes to help make the sport of snowmobiling so great and organized. There were 68 people that attended from the state of Illinois, which was second in attendance behind Wisconsin's 74. Overall, there were 384 that registered for the ISC. For those that attended, I hope you had fun while you were also learning that the sport of snowmobiling is a big international passion that involves a lot of different organizations and many different issues providing challenges to overcome to improve our sport. You will have a chance to attend next year's ISC as it is being hosted by the AWSC in Green Bay, WI.



 $\mathsf{MANSFIELD}$ — Mickey Rupp packed several lifetimes of living into his 87 years on earth.

Born Herbert Edward Rupp II on Jan. 17, 1936, in Mansfield, the business owner, entrepreneur and sportsman died Aug. 20 at his home in the city where he was born.

The son of Anna Belle (Cox) Rupp and Herbert Rupp, founding partner of Gorman-Rupp Pumps, Mickey Rupp packaged his business instincts, engineering skills and work ethic with a love for engines and speed to craft a life like none other.

- Rupp built and raced cars at the highest levels of the motorsports industry.
- Rupp founded and grew Rupp Industries, producing mini-bikes, snowmobiles and off-road vehicles, creating recreational vehicles sold and known around the world.
- Later in life, the sportsman took his skills to the water, launching Rupp Marine and designing fishing outriggers still being sold globally.

In an interview with the Mansfield News Journal, Rupp credited his dad, who joined J.C. Gorman to form the Gorman-Rupp Co. in Mansfield in 1933.

"Everything I've ever accomplished, I owe to my dad," Rupp said of the legendary inventor and engineer. "Boy, was he a hard-nosed German. You did it right or you didn't do it at all."

A lifetime of engineering, learning and trying new things

His career trajectory was never certain, but Rupp never stopped moving, learning and trying new things.

The Mansfield Senior graduate played college football at Miami University and also attended Ashland University and Purdue University. He spent three years in the U.S. Marine Corps.

In 1958, Rupp found himself unemployed and looking around for the next opportunity. Go-karts were becoming the rage in California and the 22-yearold Rupp saw a chance to marry his love for speed and design with a business opportunity.

He started building kart kits in his basement and then began manufacturing his designs that included innovations such as step frames, improved braking systems and eventually four-wheel independent suspensions.

Known his Dart Karts, the vehicles sold like crazy, still in production through the late 1960s. His brother-in-law – legendary Indianapolis 500 chassis designer A.J.Watson – appeared in a magazine ad for the 1959 Dart Kart, according to a story at WISHTV.com.

He founded Rupp Industries and created thousands of jobs for local citizens throughout the 1960s and 1970s. He and his team never stopped changing and innovating with all of the company's products, always looking to improve speed, performance, safety and durability.

In 2021, the International Snowmobile Hall of Fame honored Rupp with the Edgar Hetteen Memorial Award of Merit. According to the citation, Rupp built a Mansfield company with eight employees in 1959 into a firm in 1970 that had more than 400 employees and more than \$30 million in sales.

"Mickey Rupp rode and tested all his own products along with his employees," the Hall of Fame said. "He was always innovating and engineering new prototypes... His performance-driven sleds pushed the other larger snowmobile manufactures to build a more sporty, recreational type snowmobile."

He sold the company in 1973.

'The Greatest Spectacle in Motorsports'

Rupp's racing career was relatively brief, but again showed his desire to succeed.

Rupp made only five Indy Car series starts, in 1964 and 1965, but he finished in the top 10 in three of those races. He finished fifth at Milwaukee just a week after his sixth-place finish in the Indy 500 in 1965, a race dubbed "The Greatest Spectacle in Motorsports."

Rupp could have been the Indy 500 "Rookie of the Year" in 1965, racing in a car owned by fellow racer A.J. Foyt. But the rookie class that year included future Hall of Famers Mario Andretti, who finished third, and Gordon Johncock, who was fifth. Rupp beat a couple of other rookies that year who went on to have great racing careers — Al Unser and Joe Leonard.

In addition, Rupp set a standard perhaps no one else has in ground and air racing.

"He is certainly the only person to have both driven in the Indy 500 and raced his P-51 Mustang in the unlimited class at the Reno Air Races," said Jim Hackman, of Tempe, Arizona. "That record will undoubtedly never be equaled."

His commitment and responsibilities to his growing recreational vehicle empire pulled Rupp from the driver's seat.

Seven years after selling Rupp Industries, his love for fishing led him to found Rupp Marine in Stuart, Fla., a company that specialized in the production of high-quality sport fishing gear and accessories.

Just as he did with vehicles, Rupp never stopped trying to innovate his fishing products. One of the company's most notable achievements was the development of the first T-top mounted outrigger for center console fishing boats.

The innovative system allowed fishermen to deploy and retract their outriggers without standing on the boat's gunwale, making it easier and safer to fish in rough waters.

The company is still family owned and operated, though Rupp retired after more than 20 years at the helm and returned home to Mansfield.

Celebration of Life planned Sept. 9

Rupp is survived by four children, Kimberly (Greg) Engh, Scott (Jackie) Rupp, Karla Rupp, and Kelly (Ron) Karpanty; 13 grandchildren, Michael, Sarah and Mary Rupp, Stephen Engh, Eric, Alex and Ryan Rupp, Andy, Matt, and Tommy Barkett and Max, Owen and Elise Karpanty; and numerous nieces, nephews and cousins.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by a son, H.E."Mike" Rupp III; grandson, Clynt Tope; brother, Carl Rupp; twin brothers, Wayne and Warren Rupp; and two sisters, Virginia Rupp Hawkins and Jeannie Rupp Chaddock.

A celebration of life will be held on Saturday, Sept. 9, from 3 to 6 p.m. at Westbrook Country Club, 1098 Springmill St., according to Rupp's obituary at Wappner Funeral Directors-Ontario.

Does your son or daughter have their safety certification completed? He or she took the class in person, right? Please say yes, just to humor me if nothing else. Another reminder about Wisconsin; anyone born after 1985 must have proof that they have taken a snowmobile safety course. That includes a large portion of the snowmobile population.

Do you have trip plans made yet? Going somewhere new this year? Look ahead and figure out where to find some contact information for accurate trail updates. Local clubs are great resources for that sort of thing and probably have a hotline or website that is updated regularly regarding trail conditions, club events, etc. If it is a family trip, you are probably scheduling it during school breaks. That can be a busy time but there are always riding options that allow you to break from the crowd from time to time. Or maybe you enjoy running into larger groups to ride with, hang out at the local watering hole or hit the pool/hot tub with.
