The University of Wisconsin-Platteville Society of Automotive Engineers Clean Snowmobile Team is a group of twenty-eight young individuals who share a passion for snowmobiling, engineering and mechanics. The team is a mix of majors ranging from engineering, construction and agriculture. The team currently runs two snowmobiles: a 2020 Yamaha Sidewinder with a Ford 1.0L EcoBoost, which competes in the spark ignition classes and a 2022 Yamaha VK 540 with a Kubota D902 diesel, which competes in the compression ignition class. The team competes in the SAE Clean Snowmobile Challenge held in Houghton, MI on March 7th-9th, 2024. The goal of the competition is to design and build snowmobiles to be cleaner, quieter and more efficient. The team has won back-to-back overall spark ignition championships the last two years as well as 1st place in the sound division. In 2023, the diesel snowmobile took second overall for the compression ignition class as well as 1st place in the sound division.

The team goals for this year are to set up better clutching and tuning for both sleds to increase our acceleration and fuel economy. For the spark ignition class the team is working to eliminate even more sound, create self-deploying ice scratchers, rebuild a gear and update the electronic enclosure. The compression ignition class goals are to create an active regen diesel particulate filter or DPF and tune to minimize emissions.

Professional success is also important to the team. SAE provides many companies such as Milwaukee, Oshkosh, John Deere, RFA Engineering and many more with amazing employees who are not

only academically skilled but have real-life hands-on experience. SAE also provides opportunities for leadership though executive board. Many companies have begun to hold special networking days for the SAE teams, in hopes of reaching students with skills that align with their companies' values.

Outside of the shop and meeting times, the team participates in community service and fun team events. The community service that the team participates in include highway clean up, M clean up, M whitewashing and lighting the M for homecoming. One of our very own team members, Cade Klefstad, is doing a fantastic job to plan and make sure the big M in Platteville looks better than it ever has before. Fun events that the team participates in are testing days, team cookouts, bonfires, external events to show off the snowmobiles and more. Most recently the team attended the Belvidere Prairie Riders Grass Drags and Swap Meet.

The End of an Era - Jane Austin Retires

When the announcement of Jane Austin's retirement as the Illinois Association of Snowmobile Clubs Office Manager came, I knew we had come to the end of an era. The IASC office opened in 1986. At that time, Eric Menssen was president, and Ron Hambly was executive director. With the boards' approval and the help of Walt Olson (a snowmobile club member), an office that was once a Ski-Doo Dealership was transformed into the IASC office.

Knowing that someone needed to be in charge of organizing things, Walt suggested that maybe his sister-in-law, Jane Austin, would be willing to take on the part-time job of secretary/office manager for the IASC. Jane, a snowmobiler herself with her husband Larry, said yes.



So began Jane's career as the office manager for the IASC. Ron Hambly dropped off an old computer, a box (or four) of paper, and a mailing list of people who were to receive the IASC Magazine. Now, after 37 years, Jane is retiring from her not-so-part-time job. Oh sure, the office hours were 9 a.m.—I p.m.,

but if you had Jane's number, she would never say to call me tomorrow at the office. Her dedication to the job never had hours.

Jane filled many other positions at various times throughout the years. When no one was available, she held the position of treasurer, as well as a year or two as secretary of the IASC.



Jane has worked with 12 different presidents, in addition to countless region directors, committee chairs, magazine editors and publishers, club presidents, and club members. She was the voice you heard when you called the office. She was the constant at the IASC. She helped answer questions and provide guidance to new presidents on what needed to be done.

When membership started dropping, Jane volunteered to cut her hours back. When the membership voted to close the office, Jane just moved it into her home, so it stayed business as usual for the IASC.

Jane's dedication to the sport and her job never faltered. Although she has not ridden a sled in many years, she still volunteers much of her time to help with snowmobile safety education classes, has worked with her local club on radar runs, and was front and center helping Region 7 whenever they hosted an activity.

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Jane has worked not only with our state association but with more than twenty-three other US states and the 8 territories and provinces of Canada. If a question was asked, Jane usually knew the answer or where to find it. Jane helped bring two International Snowmobile Congresses to Illinois and has only missed three out of the 55 Congresses held. She felt she needed to go to make sure she was current on anything happening in the sport. She made many international friends over the years. She has the uncanny ability to remember things. She could remember where, when, and who was with whom from years ago. It actually came in handy at times.

Her patience is unrelenting, her heart for helping is huge, and she has been a priceless member of the IASC. She does not have big feet, but her shoes will be hard to fill. When you look up the word "manager" in the dictionary,

it states, "a person responsible for controlling or administering all or part of a company or organization; a person who controls business dealings and other aspects of the career or livelihood of an organization; a person who handles tactics, training, and activities of a sport or organization." Jane has done this and more.

At some point, the job Jane held became less about the paycheck and more about her passion for the sport. Her commitment to make sure this family of snowmobilers had whatever it needed, whenever it was needed, is what made Jane the heart of the IASC. Words cannot express the gratitude we have for all you have done to keep us going all these years. Thank you, Jane, from all the members of the snowmobiling community. You will be missed dearly. Here is hoping that you can enjoy your retirement in whatever way you want. Happy trails, Jane.



2023 Dealer of the Year

Every November, the Illinois Association of Snowmobile Clubs (IASC) recognizes many amazing people with awards over a variety of categories at its annual convention. Among these awards is the "Dealer of the Year" award. This award goes to an Illinois snowmobile dealership that has shown on every level an outstanding dedication to the sport of organized snowmobiling. To be named the dealer of the year is a great honor, a major accomplishment, shows your dedication to your customers, local clubs, the region and the sport of snowmobiling. Winning this award is something to be proud of, but to win this award three times (2013, 2019, and 2023) is nothing short of amazing and that is just what Dockside Marine has done.



Dockside Marine (located at 23210 W Strip Mine Road in Wilmington) is a family-owned business that started with boat sales in 1984 and started selling snowmobiles in 1991. Dockside offers a variety of recreational vehicles; snowmobiles, boats, personal watercraft, ATVs, UTVs, spiders, trailers and all the necessary gear to go with them, as well as snowmobile storage facilities.



Dockside Marine's owner, Terry Thomas, has been involved in organized snowmobiling for 42 years. He is the director of the I&M Trail Blazers Snowmobile Club of Minooka and occasionally uses his business



to host club meetings. He is also involved in Region 7 meetings, activities and fundraisers. Terry has used his business to support snowmobiling in Illinois in more ways than you could easily count. Aside from club meetings, Dockside Marine has hosted SEP classes and avalanche classes. They have been involved in club trips, provide snowmobiles for displays at IASC conventions, sell tri-county calendars and IASC fundraiser tickets and host a donation box on the counter to support grooming. When you purchase a snowmobile they even include payment of the first year's dues to join I&M Trail Blazers.

Perhaps one of their most notable acts of support was providing equipment for grooming local trails, which is no small feat. Dockside provided a Can-Am Defender UTV with tracks to replace worn out groomer for the 2018-2019 season. During Covid, when UTVs were nearly impossible to get, Dockside provided and installed tracks on a club members UTV to guarantee the I&M Canal would be groomed. It is evident this is an owner and a company full of employees who all share a deep passion for the sport of snowmobiling.

Beyond this award, Dockside Marine will be submitted to the American Council of Snowmobile Associations (ACSA) for the Dealer of the Year award at the International Snowmobile Congress (ISC) held June 2024 in Green Bay, Wisconsin. Our illustrious president, George Thompson, was our emcee for the entire event. He welcomed everyone, introduced speakers and helped communicate any changes on the agenda. He also had asked early into the planning stages if we had anyone for the national anthems for both U.S. and Canada. He said that it has always been on his bucket list to sing that in front of a crowd. Well, it wasn't Wrigley Field or Cellular Field (Sox Park) but he did a great job, a-cappella, I might add, for the first time. He was so nervous that he would not do it right. 

How can December be here already? October and November are a blur. I hope everyone had a great Thanksgiving and was able to gather with family and or friends. It's a great holiday in my book. I look forward to it every year. With

Christmas right around the corner, I'm sure there are many of you with the ever popular Christmas to New Year's trip planned. Like I say every year, check with the local clubs in the area you are traveling to and confirm trail conditions. Most importantly, get some reliable reports on lake conditions. With our climate these days, you cannot count on lakes being frozen solid enough for sled travel by the end of December/early January. If paths are marked across a lake, don't stray too far from those markers. Local clubs check the ice thickness and won't mark the trail until it is safe. Those markers mean the ice should be safe for riding unless extreme conditions have been experienced recently.

This is also a time for marking trails with your local club members. Please keep safety in mind during trail marking days as well. You should still not be out alone. Too many things to go wrong whether you are using a mower, tractor, UTV, chainsaw, etc. Accidents can happen so fast, no matter how careful and cautious you are. Granted, we most always have a cell phone on us at any given time, but what if you are incapacitated, or injured badly enough wher e you can't get to the phone or operate it? Did you tell anyone where you were going before you left? Would someone know where to look for you if you didn't return home at the expected time? Our club lost a darn good member several years back for this exact reason. He was out by himself, no one knew exactly where to look for him and he had passed by the time anyone reached him. Please keep these points in mind when you are considering heading out by yourself to complete a few small tasks that seem like no big deal. It only takes one little misstep to turn a routine job into a bad accident.

In closing, as you are doing all of your

pre-season prep, whether it is trailer maintenance, sled prep or tow vehicle prep, please keep safety in mind. Like the old safety videos say, expect the unexpected. Corny but true and totally applicable to almost everything we do that is snowmobile-related.

I hope everyone has a great Christmas and a safe and Happy New Year. Ride safe, folks.
