

Last year he listed the essentials on 15 Midwest locations (3 per issue) and this year is continuing that coverage, with the addition of other legendary locales outside the Midwest. So hook up your trailer and get ready to hit the road for some great riding!



KETTLE MORAINE STATE FOREST (N.), WI

When the glaciers crept across Wisconsin some 12,000 years ago, two giant lobes pushed up an 80-mile long ridge of sand and gravel between them. Today that iconic ridge runs northeast-southwest roughly from Elkhart Lake to Whitewater, with the Northern and Southern Units of the Kettle Moraine State Forest on each end. Riding through the Northern Unit is a treat, with the gently rolling landscape offering plenty of enjoyable dips and doodles. State Corridor Trail #5 runs the 25-mile length of the forest from Kewaskum to Glenbeulah and there are alternate routes nearby for the return trip.



The Illinois Association of Snowmobile Clubs held their annual convention on November 4th, 2023, at the lovely Hilton Garden Inn in Rockford, Illinois. The first weekend in November is the IASC convention where all the clubs, regions, board members, committees, and snowmobilers in the state of Illinois gather for a day of seminars, meetings, and an awards banquet. The Hilton Garden Inn is an easy to access spot, located right off the interstate. It has a restaurant and bar on site, indoor pool, fitness center, and plenty of meeting rooms. It worked out quite well, which is good news since it will also host the 2024 convention!

Many IASC members arrived in the late afternoon and early evening on Friday the 3rd and enjoyed a nice meet and greet with old friends and the opportunity to meet new ones. Hors d' oeuvres and refreshments were served. These meet and greets are a wonderful way to chat with people with no meeting agendas or any kind of organized events happening, just casual friendship and camaraderie.

Saturday morning arrived and after a nice breakfast, the morning seminars began. The first one up was a Grooming Round Table, which was very informative. This was a great space for open discussion on grooming facilitated by Mark Hazzard. He gave us an update on the different types of groomers in Illinois, the Recreational Trails Program (RTP) grants, the Snowmobile Trail Establishment Fund (STEF) grants, and how grants procedures are changing. It opened a discussion between all current clubs with groomers so we could hear what is and is not working and how things can change.

The second seminar of the day was the Unified Trail Signage Roundtable. As the name implies, this was a discussion on how to get Illinois to a place where all trails are marked with a unified marking system. Ron Julian did a wonderful job with this seminar. Everyone got to discuss the different ways of trail marking they do, and we had great input from everyone on what is right and what is not. Ron is on the committee that is working on a unified trail marking in Illinois and we all got to provide input for how this book should be done. When Ron is all done with this, we should have an excellent guide to hand out to all the clubs in the state and have a great marking program in our state.

The third seminar of the day was on Volunteerism & Retaining

Volunteers. This is a topic that we all want to learn more about for obvious reasons. We all could use more help, and any discussion lead by Kaite Polhill and Jessica Dicker is going to be a fun time. It was a wonderful seminar to finish up the morning.



Lunch was accompanied by a couple of excellent guest speakers. First up were three outstanding people from the Association of Wisconsin Snowmobile clubs: the president of the Wisconsin Association, Lori Heideman, Kids and Adults Snowmobiling (KAOS) member, Ethan Degner, and KAOS member and former Miss Snowflake, Rachyl Burzinski. They spoke to us about Wisconsin snowmobiling and explained the youth program. Lori's heart is so into snowmobiling and her dedication to the sport made her so enjoyable to listen to. Ethan and Rachyl, and truly the whole youth program in Wisconsin, are amazing. I've had the pleasure of seeing this group of young adults at two International Snowmobile Congresses, an Association of Wisconsin Snowmobile Clubs winter meeting, and now at our IASC Convention. They are incredibly hard working, fun loving, kind, and always ready to roll up their sleeves and help with anything you're doing. I think the future of the sport is in good hands. This year's IASC Convention was held at the Hilton Garden Inn, located in Rockford. With the convention taking a new turn last year to a one-day event, it was a busy, event-filled day. One of the events that helps fill the day is the awarding of Yamaha Challenge prizes to deserving students who took an instructor-taught snowmobile safety class. Not familiar with the Yamaha Challenge, you say? I'll provide some background for you. Any youth between the ages of 12 and 15 is required to be certified by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources in snowmobile safety. Students can participate in an online course or take one taught by an IDNR certified Snowmobile Safety Instructor.

To be eligible for the Yamaha Challenge, the student first must have taken the instructor-taught course. An online course does not qualify the student. Once a student has completed and passed the course, they are placed in one of three categories. Those who received a score of 100%, those missing only one question (98%), and students who missed two (96%). So, a student can only miss, at the most, two questions on the 50-question test to be in the running for Yamaha gear. There is another opportunity for those who miss more than two questions to be eligible for a prize. An instructor may nominate one student per class who they feel is truly working hard, participating in class and being an all-around good student. This student will be placed in the 96% winners' group, giving them a chance for some Yamaha gear and a helmet. There are three drawings held, one for each group of 100%, 98% and 96% gradings. First through third place winners receive various amounts of clothing provided by Yamaha Motors and a helmet provided by the Illinois Association of Snowmobile Clubs' Safety Education Program.

The 3rd place winner for '22-'23 was Charlie Wick from LaSalle. Charlie took his safety course at Leone's in Lasalle with instructors Bill Brown, Rick Vann, and Kevin Boggs teaching. This year's 2nd place winner was Emma Knudtson from Geneseo. Emma's class took place in Lena at the Lena Community Center with Suzy Giese instructing. Our first-place winner for the '22-'23 season was Taylor Brandt. Taylor is from Marseilles and also received his safety training at Leone's as well with Bill Brown, Rick Vann, and Kevin Boggs as instructors. Congratulations to all of our participants, we appreciate you putting forth the time and effort to take an instructor-taught class. I also want to thank the parents who realize the importance of getting their kids to an instructor-taught safety class. A big thank you goes out to Yamaha Motors for their continued support of the Yamaha Challenge. Our Snowmobile Safety Education Program could never provide the quality of prizes that we award without their support. I would also like to thank this year's helmet sponsors, Region 6, HennHouse BBQ and Region 2. These generous sponsors make clothing awards complete and help further our mission of snowmobile safety. I feel students get much more of an education on snowmobiling from a real, live experienced snowmobiler than they do from sitting in front of a computer. You just can't replace experience when it comes to snowmobile safety. And last, but most certainly not least, thank you to all of our snowmobile safety instructors for sharing your time, talents and experience with our snowmobiling youth. These students are the future of this sport that we all hold so dear to our hearts. Thanks again to everyone who takes time out of their busy schedules to make snowmobile safety an important part of our snowmobiling community.

In Illinois off trail snowmobile operation is technically not trespassing. "It is unlawful for any person to drive or operate any snowmobile on private property, without the

written or verbal consent of the owner or lessee thereof. Any person operating a snowmobile upon lands of another shall stop and identify himself upon the request of the landowner or his duly authorized representative, and, if requested to do so by the landowner shall promptly remove the snowmobile from the premises." (625 ILCS 40/5-1H)

The Illinois Snowmobile Grant program (SNOW) provides financial assistance to eligible local units of government (Section 3010.10 of the Illinois Administrative Code) to assist them in the purchase, construction, maintenance and rehabilitation of public snowmobile areas, trails and facilities in Illinois. The program is funded entirely by snowmobilers through their registration fees (625 ILCS 40/8-1 and 9-1).

As you have probably already heard by now, on November 14th John Dee passed away unexpectedly. I read a post that summed it up well saying, "If you snowmobile in the Midwest, you know John Dee." It started every fall with the seasonal outlook. We all couldn't wait to see John's predictions for snowfall in the Midwest. Then every season, you'd look at John's weather reports just to see if it was going to snow in your neighborhood, or anywhere in the Midwest. If you were going somewhere snowmobiling, you started checking John's weather reports about two weeks before and then daily until the morning you left for the trip. Also looking at the Northwoods trail cam network he had, you'd check that trail pic that was being taken 200 feet from the motel you were going to stay at. You could make sure the trail looked good and that they were grooming it.

Who didn't enjoy "snow church" with Rev. Snowflake? What a fun time watching that. His website was famous for good reason. John had text and graphic weather forecasts that we all loved, the trail cam network, the weekly journal, guest shots, a discussion board, the Northwoods directory, and the historical weather, where you could check out stats from years before.

John Dee grew up in Park Ridge, northwest of Chicago. After graduating from high school, he went off to the University of Wyoming where he took his first meteorology class. Later he transferred to Purdue University where he received his bachelor's degree in meteorology.

John spent a year in Washington DC working for the National

Weather Service. Then for the next 25 years he worked at a company he started called Global Weather Monitoring doing private forecasts for commodity traders. John, as someone early to the lifestyle of "working from home", moved to the Keweenaw Peninsula. After moving to the Keweenaw Peninsula, he started his weather forecasting and journal on his website, johndee.com. He also spent many years doing the weather forecasts for two radio stations, of course adding in his fun commentary.

After the success of his website, John started the "Make-A-Wish John Dee Snowmobile Ride In." During the time he had the ride in, it raised on average over \$100,000 a year for the Make-A-Wish Foundation.

In 2002, John met Nora, the love of his life, and they were married in October of 2004. In August of 2009, John became father to his daughter, Grace, whom he adored. John loved his family, his friends, riding the backcountry on his snowmobile, walking with his dogs, a swim in Lake Superior, and a good snowstorm.

I never met John personally. However, we had many email conversations and he posted many of my pictures on his website. Like most of you, I thought of him, Nora, and Grace as personal friends because of his Sunday night journal posts. He invited us into his world with his weekly report and photos, and I looked forward to reading his journal every week.

John was most surely a snowmobile legend that we will all miss. Nora, Grace and all his family are in all our prayers. As John always signed off, Good Night from the Keweenaw – JD.

Experienced snowmobilers, with years of riding experience under their belts, can provide so much more insight into all facets of riding than the onlines. There really is no comparison which educational method

offers kids the better value for their time spent learning to snowmobile safely. I realize there are most likely ways we can change/improve what we are doing to make it a more modern and interesting experience for the younger generation of students, but we also need parents on the same page as us. Is it a matter of revised teaching methods? Do we make changes to our scheduling of classes? We also need to remind folks that all of our instructors are volunteers, many who have full time jobs and families as well. Plus, most instructors are riders who enjoy riding, so there is that. 


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
