

I usually like to take a moment to let everyone know what is coming up and this time is no different.

As we start thinking about starting the snowmobile season, there is always business to take care of. The first thing we have on the IASC to-do list will be

to renew club insurance. I will contact our insurance agent to get the insurance renewal premium notices as soon as possible. Still, historically, the information has not been available until sometime in October. Make sure your club contact information is up to date with the IASC so I can get the invoice to the correct person without any delays. If you have any special requests, for example, you would like one invoice for all the clubs in your region, be sure to get that to me as soon as possible. You can email the request to me at the IASC office email address iasc.illinois@gmail. com. Our insurance term goes from December 1st to December 1st each year. The insurance premiums must be received by our agent, before November 30th, to continue our insurance coverage. I know trying to get this done can be a challenge for the clubs and that is why I want to get everyone thinking about it early. As everyone knows, the insurance premiums are reimbursed using grant funding. For your club or region to qualify for reimbursement, membership with the IASC must be current and you must be in good standing with the Illinois Secretary of State. If you have any questions concerning this, let me know.

As always, I am here to help with whatever I can to make things easier for all of us!

Let us not forget, there is an International Snowmobile Congress that meets every June where volunteers from the United States, Canada and Europe meet to work on national issues. These are all volunteers working together for one cause. Without the clubs and the members. The sport we all love would not exist.

Even more amazing is how small their numbers really are. Look at the number of registered sleds in each state. Then look at the number of club members in the same area. You will find 15%, maybe 20% at the most, belong to a club. We all need to get together and promote membership in our clubs if we want to survive. THE STATE OF THE SAME AND ADDRESS OF THE SAME ADDRESS OF T

Organized snowmobiling is one of the most successful motorized groups and the club members are active year around. In the fall, we work to prepare the trails and set up activities for club members. In the winter, we ride as well as maintain the trails. Spring is spent cleaning up the trails. The summer? Well, summer is spent meeting representatives of other snowmobile organizations, snowmobile vendors and government representatives at the International Snowmobile Congress. The Congress is an annual get together for a few days with representatives of the organizations (see side chart) that form the International Snowmobile Council and as well as a few other groups. It provides a communication forum to discuss issues facing our sport, as well as events to allow us to enjoy each other's company. In 2023, the IASC hosted a very successful ISC in Moline, IL. This year, it was a great event hosted by the AWSC in Green Bay, WI, and the IASC was well represented.



Meetings with ACSA, as well as the Trail and Mountain Groups, were held on Thursday and Saturday of which the IASC is a member Association. On Friday, there were many workshops, presentations, and round tables of various topics to assist snowmobile leadership. This was in addition to vendor displays, daily speakers, and the fun and parties that took place when we were not at meetings. On Saturday, all the groups attend the International Snowmobile Council to provide a summary of their activities/issues.

The big topic and discussions of the ACSA were the problems of trespassing, the federal government's 30-30 proposal/plan, and how to get youth involved in organized snowmobiling. There is a trespass committee that has been working hard the last few years of which IASC is represented by Dan Damptz. They have been pushing the message to "stay on the trail." This year, they introduced a "No Trespass" contest to get our young snowmobilers involved. There is a video contest for ages eighteen and up, a create a meme for ages 13 – 17, and coloring contest

for ages up to 6. More information can be found on ACSA's website at www.snowmobilers.org/docs/ACSA-no-trespass-contest-2024. pdf. Please share the word and practice "stay on the trail" while we snowmobile. Some trail closures are the result of trespassing or off trail riding problems.

If you have not heard, the US Forest Service, with the push of government leaders in Washington, is embracing the 30-30 rule. What is the 30-30 rule? It is a worldwide initiative for governments to designate 30% of earth's land and ocean area as protected areas by 2030. You can imagine that if this is successful, there will be areas closed to snowmobiling which WILL affect snowmobile trails. No thought to local economies, and the importance of outdoor recreational opportunities. ACSA is watching this via lobbyists, working with other groups and sponsoring the ACSA D.C. Fly-In which was held in April 2024. The IASC was represented at the Fly-In by George Thompson. Mark Hazzard, Mason Long and Dan Long. In addition, the Friends of Snowmobile Political Action Committee (FOSPAC) are providing contributions to the politicians that are supporting the sport of snowmobiling and the realization that the 30-30 rule will negatively impact our sport. Check out the FOSPAC website if you're interested in donating, www.snowmobilers.org/friend-of-acsa.aspx.

Last year, ACSA created an exploratory committee to develop a plan to create a Future Leaders Program. After a year, the committee reported their findings, presented a plan and requested to become a permanent committee. This was approved and will concentrate on the age group of 21-35 with the idea of getting more young individuals to get involved and recognize and listen to the input of these young people. Remember, this starts at the club level. Welcome and include these young people in your club. Let them get involved, and most importantly, listen to their ideas and thoughts.

There is much more that was discussed and updated involving ACSA. They represent our sport. They offer a scholarship program, recognize special people/clubs/business via an awards program and are working to promote the sport of snowmobiling just to name a few.

One of the big items that was talked about a lot at the ISC was the changing of the guard of the International Manufacture Association (ISMA). Ed Klim has been the executive director of this organization since the incorporation of ISMA in 1995. He announced that he is retiring, and this was his last "official" ISC. He is being replaced by Jaret Smith, who I believe will continue the great work of ISMA and the

support they provide for the sport of snowmobiling.

Friday is known to be education day at the ISC. There were 11 breakout sessions that were attended by members of the IASC executive board and hopefully will improve their leadership roles. There were the trespassing, magazine and groomer round tables for open discussion among the attendees. Tourism was the subject of 2 seminars, Wisconsin Snowmobile Friendly Communities program and Tourism 101. Other subjects were a leadership seminar, the future of snowmobiles, RTP presentation, breaking down barriers and groomer tracking presentation. The most interesting seminar I attended was "How to Make Social Media Work for you." This was presented with great slides and 2 social media executives from Polaris and BRP. I have a feeling that we may see this presentation at the IASC Convention and will highly recommend it, even if it is presented by members of the IASC E-Board.



Each day of the congress is a general session where the attendees get to listen to speakers. This year, we were greeted with a great keynote address by Andrew Nussbaum of the Wisconsin Department of Tourism. Please note that Andrew attended the whole ISC and not just the day of his speech. We were also brought up to date with Ed Klim's last annual State of the Snowmobile Industry presentation. As you can imagine, after the poor snowmobile season, sales were down, and economic impact wasn't as great this past season. Then, on Saturday, the attendees were greeted with the story of 3 old guys and their 38-day, 5000+ mile trip from Minnesota to Alaska in March of 2023. It was a remarkable story about their adventure and the problems and thrills they encountered. Check out their Facebook page! There were other speakers from the International Hall of Fame, Discover Green Bay, IASA 50th year anniversary and Woody's with their presentation of donations to several organizations from the proceeds of their annual golf outing.

What is a congress without the vendors and groomer displays? Many

companies were well represented and showcased their products. We are lucky for these representatives, and they help support the ISC and its members!



There were also plenty of fun activities. The attendees had many events to attend to meet fellow snowmobilers or to catch up with friends from other states and Canada. On Tuesday, before the start, there was a car/motorcycle/truck ride to Door County for those that came early. On Wednesday, if you did not have to set up anything, the attendees were able to visit Lambeau Field and/or the birthplace of the snowmobile in Sayner, WI. FOSPAC had their annual fundraising event/reception during the afternoon that had many games to keep the attendees busy. The ISC officially opened with the welcome reception hosted by the AWSC Wednesday night which lasted into the night.

On Thursday night, the AWSC presented the Oneida Dancers during the offsite dinner performing their traditional dances. On Friday evening, the groomer reception was held outside among all the groomer displays. This year, the attendees were welcomed to try their operational skills of several groomers as they had to complete a maze on the front blades of the groomers. It was a timed event, and guess what, a young 20-year future leader had the best time. After the groomer receptions, the host for the 2025 ISC, Prince Edward Island Snowmobile Association held a reception to showcase the 2025 ISC to be held June 11-14, 2025, in Charlottetown, PEI, Canada. The ISC is wrapped up Saturday night with the annual banquet and awards dinner, followed by the Thirsty Dog event. It was announced that this was the last Thirsty Dog event.

As you can see, the ISC is very important to snowmobilers and a great event to meet and work with snowmobilers from all over the United States' snow belt and Canada. It helps ensure the future of snowmobiling. If only it can help with the weather!



Amy E. Lindholm – Director of Federal Affairs, Conservation Funding National Coordinator, LWCF Coalition

LWCF is a simple idea: that a portion of offshore drilling fees should be used to protect important land and water for all Americans. These are not taxpayer dollars. Unfortunately, for 55 years the promise of LWCF was broken as \$22 billion was diverted from the program. The Great American Outdoors Act ended the diversion and ensures that LWCF 's permanently authorized \$900 million is used for conservation and recreation projects each year.

LWCF supports the acquisition of land and conservation easements to protect our national parks, wildlife refuges, forests, trails, and BLM sites, grants funds to the states for local and state park needs, protects critical wildlife habitat, watersheds and recreational access, and conserves working farms, ranches and forestlands that enhance local economies.

This fund is involved with the Hackmatack project in R2. George had discussions after the presentation.

This group funds numerous projects, some which benefit snowmobiling areas.

■ Safety & Education

Greetings, all. With summer winding down we are fast approaching another snowmobile season, hooray! We have been pretty fortunate this summer, at least in my neck of the woods. We have had a few of the usual stretches of miserable heat and humidity, but lately, it has been very fall-like; cool nights, dry and low humidity days. I'll take it! Really gets you in the mood for snow shows, grass drags, swap meets and all that good snowmobile related stuff.

If you are a snowmobile safety instructor, it is also time to start lining up your classes, securing a place to host, ordering materials and possibly lining up a volunteer or two. I feel if we keep doing our best, we can definitely make a difference in our snowmobiling youth. Keep offering up those classes and give those who are considering taking an online course the option to learn safety and ethics from an experienced snowmobiler. It's obviously the better option for all of those involved. I met with several members of the IDNR this summer for a roundtable discussion about the state of our Safety Education Program. I think we all walked away encouraged that there is still a future for the program and I feel we may see some positive changes in the future that benefit all Illinois snowmobilers.

Please remind folks that the safety class isn't just for those 12-15 year olds. In Wisconsin, anyone born after January 1st, 1985, is required to carry proof of having taken a snowmobile safety class. We're now

talking about a 39-40 year old individual. The DNR officer can ask for proof at any time, so make sure you hang on to that card and keep it handy. All other surrounding states honor Illinois' certification, just make sure you have the card available to present if requested. If you have had your license revoked for any reason, this class is required in order to operate a snowmobile as well.

Fall is definitely the time to begin preparing for our favorite season. So even if you are not an instructor, please keep safety in mind. Whether brushing trails, prepping the sleds, trailer or tow rig, make sure to take the extra time to exercise caution. You don't want to get rammy and careless and lose part or all of the season to an injury that could have easily been avoided. We were shorted badly last year, so let's make sure we are ready to roll this season! Local Illinois businesses and all those folks up north at our favorite riding areas will be looking for us. Until next month, enjoy the pre-season.


