

A NOTE FROM THE TREASURER

Convention 2025 Celebrating 53 Years of Organized Snowmobiling in Illinois

On November 7, 2025, the Illinois Association of Snowmobile Clubs kicked off our annual convention at Chestnut Mountain, in Galena, Illinois. Over the years the format for the convention has changed, but the desire for time to get together and visit with snowmobilers from all over the state remains unchanged. Friday night the Convention committee scheduled a mixer which gave the attendees an opportunity to sit

down and swap stories with people you sometimes only see once a year. The mixer lasts late into the night, but it is worth losing sleep to reconnect with old friends.

On Saturday, the formal schedule began with an 8am seminar. Sam Landes was the speaker and his presentation topic centered on resolving access issues with landowners. Sam was inducted into the International Snowmobile Hall of Fame in 2025 and based on his background I can see why. Kelly presented a wealth of information about the different types of insurance coverage clubs have, and the importance of each type. Kelly's presentation also coincided with Sam's presentation, as Kelly discussed the insurance coverage landowners get when snowmobile trails cross their property. Armed with the information from both these presenters, we are ready to go out and get permission to use private and public land for trails.

Once our minds were filled with knowledge, it was time for lunch! Our lunch speaker this year was Hank Armbrecht. His presentation was a travelog style account of an annual trip he hosts called the brew tour. Hank is no stranger to Illinois snowmobiling, as he and his wife Kim were longtime members of clubs in Illinois before they moved to upper Michigan. It was great to have an old friend of many of the people in the room talk about the fun he has had

snowmobiling. He invited us all to participate in his annual ride too!

Next, we had the IASC annual meeting. If you do not have the time to attend the entire convention, you should try to get a club representative to this meeting. us understand ways to work with landowners and other trail partners to preserve our snowmobile trails. Sam has a great deal of experience of working with Wisconsin legislation, landowners, land management organizations and county/ local government as the AWSC legislative Committee Chair. Hopefully the attendees walked out with ideas of how to deal with possible landowners' issues to resolve them in our best interest.



Next up was Kelly O'Conner, owner of V & V Insurance Agency. The IASC has used the V & V agency for our club insurance for many years as they specialize in snowmobile organizations and are very aware of snowmobilers' needs. They have developed a great relationship with many other states throughout the snowbelt to help with insurance needs. Kelly provided background of what our coverage includes, how to help foresee issues and decrease problems, or at least be prepared for insurance issues facing our sport. Many questions were asked and answered as well as the stress of working with the landowners to develop a relationship to allow snowmobile trails on their property. Insurance is constantly changing as liability factors always are out there to be aware of and we need to be prepared for. Kelly said his staff are always available to help your club with its questions.

After soaking in on the information provided by the 2 seminars, the attendees gathered for lunch. After the welcome by our President, Kia Steward, and acknowledgment of visitors and many important people, and lunch, we had a presentation by Hank Armbrecht. Hank is a former member/officer of several IASC snowmobile clubs that met his wife at an IASC Convention many years ago. Hank and Kim are now currently

On Friday, January 17th, I headed north to Mercer, Wisconsin with my new Arctic Cat Catalyst ZR 600. I joined other snowmobile club members for a weekend ride to check out my new sled. I wanted to evaluate my sled in its original stock condition and see how it performed before making any changes.

On Friday afternoon, I put on 50 miles with an uneventful, but good day. We took off from the motel after breakfast on Saturday morning and around 11am, the disaster struck. I was the last one in a group of three on Trail 9, south of Upson and northwest of Island Lake. I hit an icy area on the trail and the sled started to fishtail. This was the first mistake as, remember, it was the maiden voyage with no studs yet. I tried to counter steer, but the left ski caught the edge of the trail and sucked the sled into the woods, stopping moments later 12 feet down in a ravine.

I was ejected from the sled, collided with a tree, and subsequently struck by the sled. I was now 12 feet down from the trail, stuck between a very solid tree and my snowmobile. It took me a second to gather my senses. I took off my helmet and set it down next to me, which was my second mistake. The helmet then slid a couple of feet away, just out of my reach. The helmet I had today did not have a helmet communicator set up, but if it did, I just lost my opportunity to communicate with others in my group.

I tried to crawl from between the tree and sled but the pain in my leg was unbearable every time I tried to move. I was now certain I had broken my leg. I was going to have to wait for my group to return to help me. I was only wearing one glove and noticed my other glove sitting next to my helmet, which I could not reach. I always have a pair of glove liners in my coat pocket and put one on so both hands would be covered and warm. I saw my two friends and other groups pass by several times, but being in the ravine, no one could see me; I only saw their helmets as they passed.

I looked at the tree I had run into and decided I could break off a branch and try waving it, hoping to get the attention of riders going by. It was at this time; I realized my chest and upper back hurt. This was my third mistake. It was supposed to be extremely cold, so I left

my TEK-Vest at home and put on extra layers to stay warm.

I did not know why at the time, but I had to suck up the pain in my right side to hold up the branch with both hands and wave it as hard as I could every time sleds went by. Now, I could hear my phone ringing... My fourth mistake. I usually have my cell phone in my coat's breast pocket, but today it was in my glove/goggle box on the dash of my sled. The sled which I could not reach, and every time I tried to pull myself up again the pain in my leg was just too much to bear. I knew my friends were trying to call me, but I could not get to the phone. My Polaris Ride command app was on, and our group used it to track each other's location all day, so I expected them to arrive any minute. Interesting idea, but although I had a phone signal, everyone in the group said I did not show up on the app. That part was just bad luck, not my mistake.

I was getting cold and started to shiver. I knew this was not good, but I kept waving my stick every time I heard sleds, though I just could not get anyone's attention. My phone rang a couple more times and by now, I had started shaking. Shortly thereafter, I was no longer cold anymore, I actually felt perfectly comfortable. I still had enough sense to realize this was bad, hypothermia or shock I guessed. I had been in this ravine for an hour and a half so there comes a point in time when you realize this might be it. No one can see me, and I cannot get anyone's attention. I eventually came to the conclusion there was a very good chance I was going to die. So, I said my prayers, made my peace with God, and ended my prayer with the comment, "If I can get one more favor, I could sure use one right now."

Just moments after I finished my prayer, I heard a semi-truck. Well, an empty logging truck, I realized as it went past me, but the passenger side was what I saw. Darn it, I thought, if it had been on the driver's side, the driver may have seen me. A brief time later, I heard a semi-truck again. I looked up as I was waving my stick, and I saw a fully loaded logging truck going by with the driver's side facing me now. A moment later, I heard air brakes. I then heard several crunching noises, which were the sounds of the logger's

boots walking in the snow. I will never forget that sound, a relief, and the favor I asked for. A second later, I saw the logger standing there, looking down at me, and he asked, "Are you ok?" to which I replied, "Absolutely not!" He asked if he should call 911, to which I quickly replied, "Please". The good Lord sent me an angel dressed as a logger. Not what I imagined, but thank you, Lord!

A couple of snowmobilers stopped to see what was going on, and they tried to figure out how to drag me up to the trail, but my angel logger said, "Leave it to the professionals, they are on the way. The guy says he can move his feet and toes, you could hurt him really bad if you move him." Again, thank God for this angel. The ambulance arrived. The paramedics and the snowmobilers all crawled down into the ravine. The snowmobilers moved my sled, the paramedics slid a backboard under me, put on a head and neck brace, and secured me to the board. I could not see anything but the sky above, but as I moved my eyes from side to side, I could see the pants of the paramedics and the bibs of snowmobilers. Everyone was carrying me, and I heard lots of huffing and puffing. I again prayed that they did not drop me, imagining I would take off like a toboggan down the hill, but thankfully they got me out of the ravine and into the ambulance. My friends arrived soon after I was taken to the ambulance, but the police barred their entry. I do not know the name of the logger or any of the snowmobilers who helped but cannot express how thankful I am to them. The paramedic wrapped me up in blankets and said the thermostat in the ambulance went up to 79 degrees and that is where he set it. I could warm up a little on the way to the hospital.

I arrived at a hospital in Ironwood, Michigan. The nurse in the ER told me I was now up to 88 degrees, but who knows what my temperature was when they found me? A trauma doctor checked me out. I heard him ask to see my helmet and then say, "We are going to do a CAT scan and x-rays, but by the looks of that helmet, his neck and back should be ok." I was diagnosed with a fractured right femur, a broken clavicle, and four rib fractures. The facility I was in was not equipped for the repairs I needed and due to the severe winds today, I could not be air lifted. So I got a two-and-a-half-hour ambulance ride to Aspirus hospital in Wausau, Wisconsin.

I would spend the next month in the hospital. I had surgery to fix my broken femur with a rod and a couple of screws. After a few days in the hospital, I was transferred to rehab for further recovery. The entire staff in the rehab unit were amazing. The directors, the doctor, physical therapy staff, occupational therapy staff, nurses. and CNAs were impressive to say the least. There are too many names to mention here, but I will mention one, Charity, my physical therapist. I was in a wheelchair and could not even stand without a machine to help me upon arrival. In just over two weeks, she had me walking a thousand feet a day. Although it was challenging, painful, and extremely exhausting, I would not have been able to walk without her assistance and dedication. I may have called her Sarge and Hitler's sister on more than one occasion, but she knew how to push me to my limits. As I was being discharged. I teared up. hugged her, and thanked her for helping me to walk again. I thank Charity again for her expertise. I hope none of you ever go through rehab, but if you must, this place is top notch. It was a wonderful facility with the most caring staff you could ever ask for.

Ultimately, I know I made a couple of mistakes, but the reason I drafted this story is to ask you what have we all learned from my

mishap? We need a way to contact the outside world in case of an accident. Whether we are in the mountains out west, the woods up north or in the middle of a corn field, how do we get help if something happens?

In the mountains out west, everyone rides with the GPS locators due to the possibility of an avalanche, but why wouldn't this be a great tool in the Midwest too? Mountain riders also use the shoulder mount two-way radios, which is another great tool. I am familiar with Oxbow's Bluetooth brand, but there are many models available. At minimal, remember a cell phone belongs in your coat pocket, not the glove box. Additionally, smart watches can make calls and send text messages, and they are on your wrist, but we must remember we are away from civilization. In the thick tree-covered woods. the cell signal can be very weak. Satellite phones are reasonably priced, offer global coverage, and are dependable for emergencies. However, some have high monthly costs. The big plus is satellite phones can connect to someone anywhere on earth, even in areas without cell service. Helmet communicators work great too, my Chatterbox system has a range of five miles, and the battery will last 8-10 hours, which should get you through the day and keep you in communication with your group. Devices like Garmin inReach or SPOT allow communication with 911 via satellite, including calls and texts. You can make phone calls and send text messages through onX, but it does not have cellar capabilities, so you need a Wi-Fi connection as it lacks SIM card capabilities. But onX is a great tool for determining if you are on public or private land. The manufacturers have ways to communicate with other riders of the same models (sled to sled) if you have your group's set-ups are done ahead of time, and your sled is still able to work. There also are many apps out there like Google and Rapid SOS for your phone that let you contact 911. Currently, only 55% of 911 call centers can receive text messages, though efforts are ongoing to improve this. Polaris Ride Command is a nice tool for tracking people in your group, not able to contact 911 or anyone else, but an excellent location tool. Many of the latest smartphones are equipped with an emergency feature that enables users to send an SOS signal, including GPS coordinates, to a pre-programmed contact number or directly to emergency services (911).

I want you all to think about the group you ride with and determine which one, or better, which two means of communication we discussed work best for you. We all need a way to communicate with each other in case of an emergency in our own group, but also in case we come upon another sledder or group with troubles. These devices can also help prevent emergencies by being a way to contact someone if a tree has fallen on the trail, or a bridge needs some kind of emergency repair.

While the communication options are abundant these days, I probably missed something. If you are thinking of any other devices, I encourage you to let me know so I can provide updates to keep everyone informed. I feel fortunate to still be here today, and I feel my experience is an opportunity to let others learn from my mistakes. I have told the story hundreds of times, talked at an SEP class and now written a magazine story about it. Hoping to set everyone up for a safer experience this next season. At the end of it all I am so grateful to still say... see you on the trail.

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

Greetings all, I hope everyone had a great Thanksgiving and maybe had a chance to see some white gold? By this time of year, most folks (other than me, that is) have their sleds prepped, trailer checked out and are ready to head out at a moment's notice. With all of the hustle and bustle that tends to go along with the holiday season, make sure you stay focused when you are taking care of the snowmobile season preparations. If you have multiple sleds, keep records of what has been done to which sled. Even if someone else works on your sleds, keep track of everything. It

makes it easy to see what maintenance will be coming due on what sled, just flip through a file or folder on your computer and there you have it. It's also impressive when it comes time to sell or trade. Your sled registration is up to date, correct? Remember that sled registration dollars are the backbone of our state's grant program. These monies are what help local clubs mark and maintain trails, so don't sell us all short by not registering your sled in the state that you live in. If you're an Illinois snowmobiler you most likely have a snowmobile trailer. Make sure the plates are up to date, tires are road-worthy and all of the lights are functional. Even if you have an aluminum trailer, the axles are most likely steel. And we all know what kinds of conditions our trailers are operating in, see if road salt has taken its toll on anything underneath the trailer deck. Wheel bearings are another biggie that should be on your list. A lot of trailers have smaller wheels on them and those bearings are spinning at high rates of speeds when you're cruising along at 70 mph. There have been plenty of trailers parked along the side of the road with bearing failure as the reason. Don't forget the spare tire(s)

either, an easy one to overlook. Make sure it holds air, isn't dry-rotted and the rim is in good condition. While you are checking the wheel bearings, tires, etc., try loosening the lug nuts. If they haven't been removed for a long time they could be very hard to get out. Finding this out now vs on the shoulder along some highway on a frigid day with cars whizzing by makes for a much better repair scenario. It is much easier to deal with in your garage or shop where it's warm and dry and you have all of the tools you need. Trailer safety is just as important as snowmobile safety, in my opinion. Trailer trouble can put both you and other drivers at risk, so don't overlook simple things that could turn into bigger things and ruin a travel trip or get someone hurt before you even get to your destination. Wishing everyone a Merry Christmas, a Merry, white Christmas, that is! Ride safe, stay to the right.
